

Content editor - Bengali | Role & responsibilities

<u>India Development Review</u> (IDR), founded as a nonprofit in 2017, is Asia's largest independent media platform that advances knowledge and insights on philanthropy and social impact. We publish cutting-edge ideas, lessons, and insights, written by and for the people working on some of India's toughest problems.

In 2022, we launched <u>IDR Hindi</u> with the aim of widening our reach and catering to a larger audience. And since January 2024, our content has been available in other regional Indian languages as well, starting with Bengali, Gujarati, and Marathi.

As a first step, we identified IDR articles that would be carried in these languages. These were then translated using a translation tool, following which the translated draft was reviewed by an editor fluent in both English and the concerned language before being published. We are now looking to expand our pool of editors.

What we are looking for

The Bengali editor—ideally someone with knowledge of and experience in the development sector—is expected to ensure that the intended meaning and essence of the original article is not lost, and so make language edits wherever necessary. They will not be required to make structural changes to the article. The focus should be on keeping the article as simple and reader-friendly as possible.

What we are offering

The fee for each article would be as follows:

Up to 1000 words: INR 750 1000–1500 words: INR 1250 1500–2000 words: INR 1750 2000–2500 words: INR 2250 2500–3000 words: INR 2750 3000–3500 words: INR 3250
